Like all such characters he has moments of so-called repentance that lasts for only the time it takes to gain from his friends what he wants to gratify his desire for more of that which intoxicates, after which he becomes even worse than before.

The Devil has him in chains and makes sport of him. Like an actor, he is capable of dropping penitential tears when it suits his purpose, and like his master, the Devil, he can make more promises to be broken than he ever dreamed of performing.

Do not ask me to account for such strange behavior, for I cannot do it. During all my life I have not come in contact with a man who has been so badly punished by the Devil for consenting to become his slave. He has been starved, made homeless and almost friendless by the Devil's scores of times. That drunkard's answer to you, if you should ask him why he pursues the pathway of sin, would be what he said to me yesterday: "How can I help it?"

There are, however, examples of those who have put their hands in the hands of Christ and never let go their hold upon Him. Such men and women, if they will only keep humble and prayerful, will no doubt succeed in resisting the Devil until the end.

### PLAYING CHILDREN.

The Sight of Which Caused Suicide.

Washington, D. C., January 19.—"Mamma, look out of the window," is replying to a baby voice, Mrs. Archie Wiley, a divorcee plaintiff, living with relatives in this city, found her first opportunity to commit suicide after being closely watched all day.

As she looked out upon her three small children at play in the rear yard about 5 o'clock this afternoon, Mrs. Wiley shot herself in the head.

Her father, James G. Sharps, committed suicide by shooting himself a year ago in this city. Since this occurrence Mrs. Wiley has been unhappy, and recently she filed a suit for divorce in Cleveland, Ohio. Her husband, Archie Wiley, a business man of Cleveland, formerly lived in this city.

A close friend of Mrs. Wiley had kept vigil all day over the woman, fearing she would attempt to end her life. This morning she stated that she would kill herself, and every precaution was taken to foil any effort in that direction.

It was thought everything which she might use to end her life had been put out of her reach. She had concealed a pistol in the house, however, and when she was called to the window by her child, she secured and used it with fatal result.

Since her return to Washington from Cleveland with her three children, Mrs. Wiley has been melancholy, and during the last two weeks her friends have found it difficult to give her any cheer.

The divorce petition, in which she charges her husband with various short-comings, is pending in the Cleveland courts. Her husband has been notified, and her body will be held, pending his arrival. Mrs. Wiley was about 37 years old. Her children were all under 12 years of age.—Ex.

### STRANGE WAGER.

Trainer Bets \$500 Elephant Can Remember Back Twenty Years.

Has an elephant memory? If so, how much of a memory? These questions will be decided Sunday, and a wager of \$500 hangs on the outcome of a practical test conducted by Trainer Peter Barlow before a committee of experts in the deep-down of the New York Hippodrome. Barlow bets Dr. Maria J. Potter the money that he can put Basil, a giant elephant through stunts which the elephant did 20 years since.

Basil is 45 years old, and stands 8 feet 11 inches. He was broken into by trainer "Doc" Welch. Who died many years ago. Since then Basil has passed a quiet life with various circus, being chiefly used to move around wagons and pull out stakes.

Potter bought the monster several weeks ago from the owners of Glen Island where Basil had been exhibited for the last few years.

"Too bad Basil has no memory," remarked Dr. Potter to Barlow.

"He has a memory all right," replied Barlow.

"Then he ought to remember the stunts he did when he was a trick elephant before his trainer died."

"He will," insisted Barlow. "I'll bet you \$500 that he does."

"You are on," said Dr. Potter. "Only you will have to put the big animal through the very tricks he did 20 years ago."

Basil since the bet was made has been well plunketed, for Dr. Potter has an idea that Barlow will attempt to teach the elephant some new tricks between now and Sunday. Prof. William Hornaday, of the Bronx Zoo, and a number of men away on elephants will be present when the tests take place. Barlow is doing no boasting, but he insists that Basil will answer all questions and show science that he kind is the most intelligent of animals.

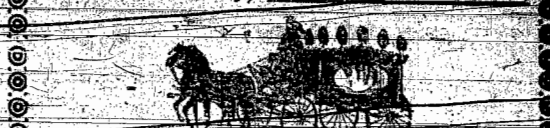

### ANIMAL MUD BATHERS.

The Wild Boar, the Water Buffalo and the Elephant.

Animals when wild constantly die a lingering death from injury to the skin, whether caused, as usually happens in tropical countries, by wounds inflicted by insects or by poisonous diseases, or by the "mud" which they take in making their toilet and in the mud selection of "beautifiers." Among birds the salt water species often seek fresh water to wash in. In the forest land birds choose different earths in which to dust and also wash in water, and nearly every tropical animal, including the tiger, bathes either in water or in mud. Perhaps the best known mud bathers are the wild boar, the water buffalo and the elephant.

"I have seen an immense range of mud over all animals in the use of its trunk for dressing wounds. It is at once a syringe, a powdering puff and a hand."

Water, mud and dust are the main "applications" used, though in some times covers a sun scorched back with grass or leaves. "Wounded elephants," writes Sir Samuel Baker, "have a marvellous power of recovery when in their wild state, although they have no gifts of surgical knowledge, their blisters being caused by plastering their wounds with mud or blowing dust upon the surface. Dust and mud comprise the entire pharmacopoeia of the elephant, and this is applied upon the most serious occasions. I have seen them, when in a tank plaster up a bullet wound with mud taken from the bottom."—London Spectator.

### CHINESE SERVANTS.

How They Pass Along Information About Their Employers.

In China it is a common thing for some people to bewitch the back of a cook, while their neighbors have numbers offering themselves directly for the vacancy. The reason of this is that each cook hands on to his successor his employer's "character." This he does by means of a sauceman left standing in the kitchen.

If the place be considered a good one a sauceman will be left on the ground with the lid put on properly. If the lid be put on wrong way upward it means that the place is a good one and that the cook has only left for a time and means to return as soon as he can. If the lid be put half in and half out of the sauceman it indicates that the place is not good one, but the master is stingy. If the lid be hanging on and some things be left in it shows that the servant is quite satisfied with everything concerning the owners of the house, but that he is obliged to leave owing to debts or other causes which inconvenience him. If the employer be in the habit of making his servants pay for lost or broken articles a chalk mark will be found on the bottom of the sauceman, which will not easily be rubbed off.

The Chinese "boy" makes his mark behind the bedroom or pantry door and the waterman his on the bottom of the tub. These signs are said to have been originally adopted by the Chinese from the Tamils.

Why Some Men Are Superstitious.

There are men who have a congenital tendency to distrust fate. With the better half of their minds they may be optimists, but there is a corner which is never free from the pain of fear, the fear of a sort of transcendental spite. Ptolemy said of the superstitious that they believed in the gods and believed them to be unfriendly. Some survival of this pagan notion remains to this day even among those whose reasonable conviction and reverent faith alike lead them to totally opposite conclusions. They do not believe they will have more misfortunes if they take a house which is numbered 13 than if they took one numbered 11, but they avoid the former in order to quiet their own painful imaginations.—London Spectator.

Mrs. Mara had a voice that extended from middle G to E in all and was one of the most facile and flexible ever known. She delighted in the vocal music of France, Germany, Russia, Italy, and elsewhere.
